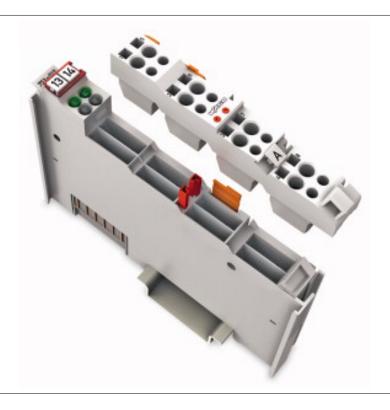

# 3 Device Description

The 753-517 Digital Output Module transmits binary control signals from the automation device to the connected actuators (e.g., solenoid valves, contactors, transmitters, relays or other electrical loads).

The I/O module has 2 output channels, providing a direct connection to actuators. The actuators can be wired directly to the CAGE CLAMP® connectors DO 1 or /DO 1 (i.e. NOT DO 1) of channel 1 resp. DO 2 or /DO 2 (i.e. NOT DO 2) of channel 2.

The assignment of the connections is described in the "Connectors" section. Connection examples are shown in section "Connecting Devices" > ... > "Connection Example(s)".

# **NOTICE**

#### **Inductive loads must be dampened!**

For the protection of relay coils and contacts, inductive loads must be dampened with an effective protection circuit!

Examples of protection circuits can be seen in the section "Protective Circuits for Contacts of Relay Modules".

The I/O module incorporates two change-over relays connected potential free. This means on the field side only the connections of the relay contacts are present. Therefore, both relays can be operated with different voltages.

Because of the potential free contacts also a serial connection of the two relays is possible as well as a serial connection of several relays with block wise connection of several modules.

The relay contacts 11 and 21 can be connected to an external voltage of 230 VAC resp. 300 VDC.

# NOTICE

#### No use of different phases of a three-phase system on both channels!

The max. voltage between adjacent connections may not exceed 250 VAC. The use of different phases of a three-phase system on both channels of the relay output module 753-517 is not permitted!

Depending on the relay status the voltage of the middle contact 11 resp. 21 is switched to the lower contact 12 resp. 22 or to the upper contact 14 resp. 24. In the OFF state the contacts 11 resp. 21 are switched to the lower contacts 12 resp. 22.

The internal system voltage is used to trigger the relays.

The switching status of the two relays is indicated via green status LEDs.



The meaning of the LEDs is described in the "Display Elements" section.

With consideration of the power jumper contacts, the individual modules can be arranged in any combination when configuring the fieldbus node. An arrangement in groups within the group of potentials is not necessary.



# Note

#### Use supply modules for ground (earth)!

The I/O module has no power jumper contacts for receiving and transmitting the earth potential. Use a supply module when an earth potential is needed for the subsequent I/O modules.

The I/O module 753-517 can be used with all fieldbus couplers/controllers of the WAGO-I/O-SYSTEM 750.

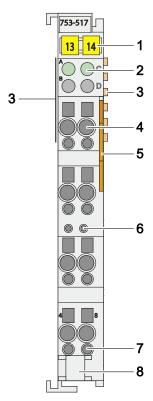


Figure 1: View

### 3.2 Connectors

### 3.2.1 Data Contacts/Internal Bus

Communication between the fieldbus coupler/controller and the I/O modules as well as the system supply of the I/O modules is carried out via the internal bus. It is comprised of 6 data contacts, which are available as self-cleaning gold spring contacts.

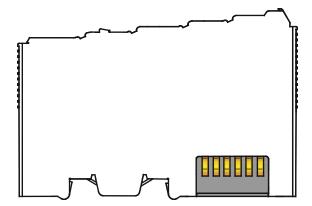


Figure 2: Data Contacts

# NOTICE

Do not place the I/O modules on the gold spring contacts!

Do not place the I/O modules on the gold spring contacts in order to avoid soiling or scratching!



# NOTICE

#### Ensure that the environment is well grounded!

The devices are equipped with electronic components that may be destroyed by electrostatic discharge. When handling the devices, ensure that the environment (persons, workplace and packing) is well grounded. Avoid touching conductive components, e.g. data contacts.



### 3.2.2 Power Jumper Contacts/Field Supply

The I/O module 753-517 has no power jumper contacts.

Use a supply module for field-side power supply of downstream I/O modules.

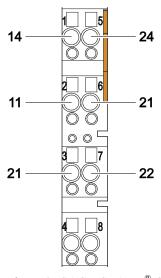


Figure 3: CAGE CLAMP® Connectors

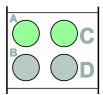


Figure 4: Display Elements

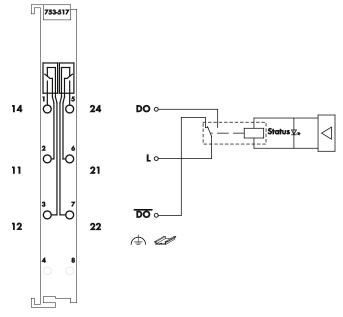


Figure 5: Schematic Diagram

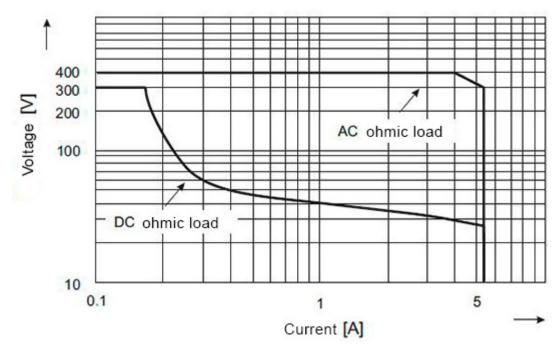


Figure 6: Load Limiting Curve of the Relay

# 5 Mounting

# 5.1 Mounting Sequence

Fieldbus couplers/controllers and I/O modules of the WAGO-I/O-SYSTEM 750/753 are snapped directly on a carrier rail in accordance with the European standard EN 50022 (DIN 35).

The reliable positioning and connection is made using a tongue and groove system. Due to the automatic locking, the individual devices are securely seated on the rail after installation.

Starting with the fieldbus coupler/controller, the I/O modules are mounted adjacent to each other according to the project design. Errors in the design of the node in terms of the potential groups (connection via the power contacts) are recognized, as the I/O modules with power contacts (blade contacts) cannot be linked to I/O modules with fewer power contacts.

# **△ CAUTION**

### Risk of injury due to sharp-edged blade contacts!

The blade contacts are sharp-edged. Handle the I/O module carefully to prevent injury.

# NOTICE

#### Insert I/O modules only from the proper direction!

All I/O modules feature grooves for power jumper contacts on the right side. For some I/O modules, the grooves are closed on the top. Therefore, I/O modules featuring a power jumper contact on the left side cannot be snapped from the top. This mechanical coding helps to avoid configuration errors, which may destroy the I/O modules. Therefore, insert I/O modules only from the right and from the top.



# Note

#### Don't forget the bus end module!

Always plug a bus end module 750-600 onto the end of the fieldbus node! You must always use a bus end module at all fieldbus nodes with WAGO-I/O-SYSTEM 750 fieldbus couplers/controllers to guarantee proper data transfer.



# 5.2 Inserting and Removing Devices

# NOTICE

#### Perform work on devices only if they are de-energized!

Working on energized devices can damage them. Therefore, turn off the power supply before working on the devices.

### 5.2.1 Inserting the I/O Module

1. Position the I/O module so that the tongue and groove joints to the fieldbus coupler/controller or to the previous or possibly subsequent I/O module are engaged.

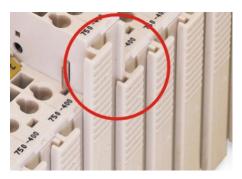


Figure 7: Insert I/O Module (Example)

2. Press the I/O module into the assembly until the I/O module snaps into the carrier rail.

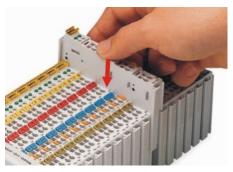


Figure 8: Snap the I/O Module into Place (Example)

With the I/O module snapped in place, the electrical connections for the data contacts and power jumper contacts (if any) to the fieldbus coupler/controller or to the previous or possibly subsequent I/O module are established.



### 5.2.2 Removing the I/O Module



# Note

### Remove pluggable connector!

Before removing a 753 Series I/O Module from the node, you must first remove the pluggable connector from the module (see section "Connector Removal")!

1. Remove the I/O module from the node by pulling the release tab.

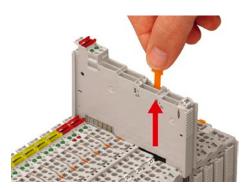


Figure 9: Removing the I/O Module (Example)

Electrical connections for data or power contacts are disconnected when removing the I/O module.

# 5.3 I/O Modules with Pluggable Wiring Level (Series 753)

Series 753 I/O modules feature a pluggable connector for I/O wiring. This connector is simply plugged into the bottom of the module. The connector can be completely removed together with the wiring, simplifying replacement of defective modules from the assembly.

Miniature WSB marking tags ensure that the right connector is matched up with the right I/O module (see figure below).

This connector provides an option for attaching cable binders.

### **5.3.1** Coding

Coding using small plastic pins and sockets facilitates mating of the module with the appropriate connector.

1. Insert the pin into the socket.

2. Position the assembled coding fingers in the I/O module. Due to its design, each coding finger allows four different coding options (i.e.; 16 different options using two coding fingers).

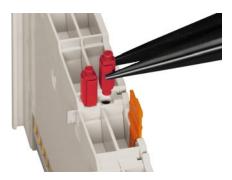


Figure 14: Inserting the Coding Fingers

3. Place the connector onto the I/O module.

4. When the connector is removed the sockets remain in the I/O module. The coded connector can only fit in the corresponding coded I/O module (see figures below).

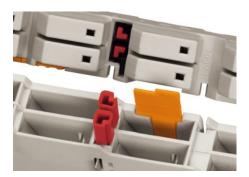


Figure 16: "Sure Match" Coding Fingers



### 5.3.2 Connector Removal

1. Remove the connector from the I/O module by pulling the orange pull tab on the connector toward the top of the module.

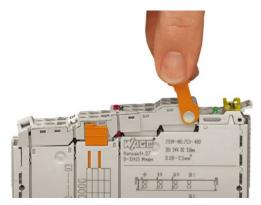


Figure 17: Pulling the Pull Tab

The connector detaches from the module.

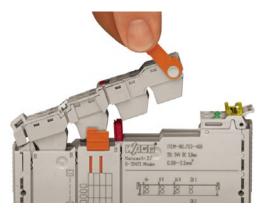


Figure 18: Removing the Connector Without Tools

2. Alternatively, you can also use a standard screwdriver at the position shown (in the figure below) to remove the connector.

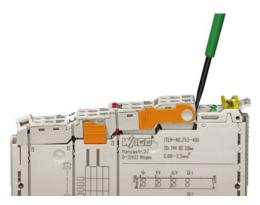


Figure 19: Removing the Connector Using a Screwdriver

### 6 Connect Devices



# DANGER

#### Only connect or disconnect lines when power is safely isolated!

The lines to the device can carry hazardous voltages and currents. Contact with the lines when live can result in severe injury or death. Therefore, read and observe the following safety rules before you perform work on the device:

- 1. Disconnect the respective system component from the power supply.
- 2. Secure the system component against unintentional restart.
- 3. Check if the voltage is positively isolated.

# 6.1 Connecting a Conductor to the CAGE CLAMP®

The WAGO CAGE CLAMP® connection is appropriate for solid, stranded and finely stranded conductors.



# Note

#### Only connect one conductor to each CAGE CLAMP®!

Only one conductor may be connected to each CAGE CLAMP<sup>®</sup>. Do not connect more than one conductor at one single connection!

If more than one conductor must be routed to one connection, these must be connected in an up-circuit wiring assembly, for example using WAGO feed-through terminals.

#### **Exception:**

If it is unavoidable to jointly connect 2 conductors, then you must use a ferrule to join the wires together. The following ferrules can be used:

Length: 8 mm

Nominal cross section max.: 1 mm<sup>2</sup> for 2 conductors with 0.5 mm<sup>2</sup> each 216-103 or products with comparable properties

- 1. For opening the CAGE CLAMP® insert the actuating tool into the opening above the connection.
- 2. Insert the conductor into the corresponding connection opening.
- 3. For closing the CAGE CLAMP® simply remove the tool. The conductor is now clamped firmly in place.



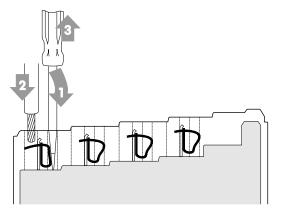


Figure 20: Connecting a Conductor to a CAGE CLAMP  $^{\! \otimes \! }$

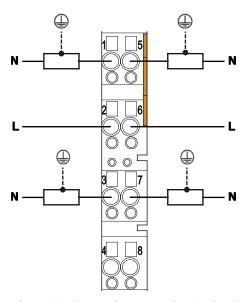


Figure 21: Connection Example, 1-Wire Connection for Protection Class I Actuators (Ground Conductor)

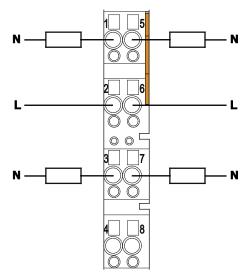


Figure 22: Connection Example 1-Wire Connection for Protection Class II (Double Isolated) and Class III (Safety Extra-Low Voltage) Actuators



#### 6.2.3 Operating the Relay in Separate Current Circuits

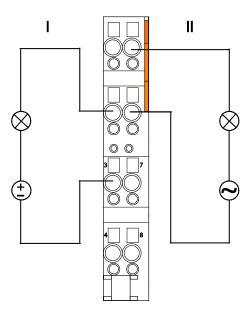


Figure 23: Connection Example – Separate Current Circuits

In this connection example, the I/O module operates in two separate current circuits. In current circuit I (DC), channel 1 acts as a break contact. In current circuit II (AC), channel 2 acts as a main contact. In this way, the following logical function is realized:

- OUT I = /DO1
- OUT\_II = DO2



### 6.2.4 Operating the Relay in Series Connection

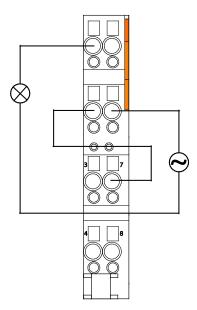


Figure 24: Connection Example – Series Connection

In this connection example, the channels of the I/O module are in series connection. Channel I acts as a main contact in the current circuit, channel 1 as a break contact. In this way, the following logical function is realized:

• OUT = DO1  $\Lambda$  /DO2



## 6.3 Protective Circuits for Contacts of Relay Modules

Switching off inductive loads such as contactors and solenoid valves can generate transients with voltage peaks of up to several thousand volts. Very often, these transients exceed the permissible limits specified in the EMC standards. They must therefore be limited by using external protective circuits.

Furthermore, they cause an arc, which may destroy the switching contact, and has a significant impact on the lifetime and safety of the relay. The following protective circuits, which are directly connected to the source of the interference in parallel with the consumer, have proved successful in practice:

#### 7 Use in Hazardous Environments

The **WAGO-I/O-SYSTEM 750** (electrical equipment) is designed for use in Zone 2 hazardous areas.

The following sections include both the general identification of components (devices) and the installation regulations to be observed. The individual subsections of the "Installation Regulations" section must be taken into account if the I/O module has the required approval or is subject to the range of application of the ATEX directive.

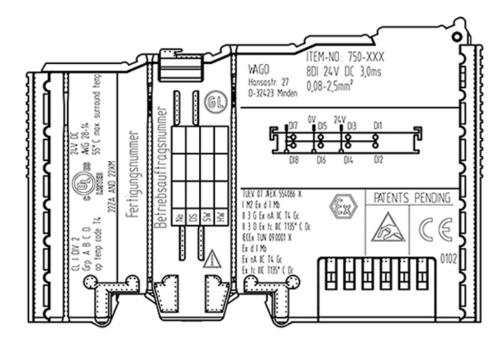


Figure 30: Side Marking Example for Approved I/O Modules According to ATEX and IECEx

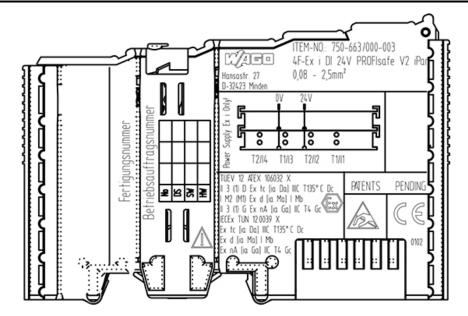


Figure 32: Side Marking Example for Approved Ex i I/O Modules According to ATEX and IECEx.

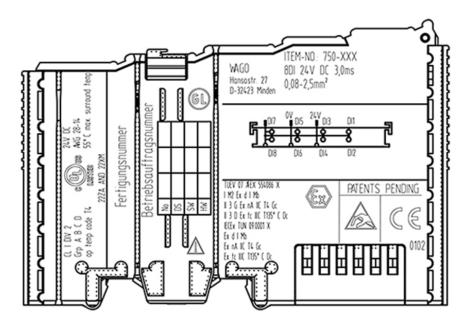


Figure 34: Side Marking Example for I/O Modules According to NEC 500

## 7.2 Installation Regulations

For the installation and operation of electrical equipment in hazardous areas, the valid national and international rules and regulations which are applicable at the installation location must be carefully followed.
